◀ First Aid, a medicine cabinet decorated with the Red Cross symbol, was modeled on Thomas Ericksson's 1992 Cross Medicine Cabinet for Cappellini, a simple cross-shaped lacquered metal cabinet that comes in five colors, including red and white.

The Cross Medicine Cabinet "is good for putting little bottles of medicine in," said Alexandra Angle, a Los Angeles interior designer who created the new cabinet with her husband, Eliot Angle, an interior designer. "But the cutouts take out a lot of space."

What really inspired them, she said, were the symbols: "The Swiss flag is red with a white cross in the center of it. And in Los Angeles, the medical marijuana stores have been going up everywhere, and the identifier is a green cross placed in a window."

The new cabinet, 28 inches square and 4½ inches deep, is made of lacquered wood with a mirrored cross in front, and comes in red, white and green, for \$1,500. Information: (213) 252-8500 or info@alexandraangle.com.
